Wade Kelly saved the lives of four people
who got caught in a dangerous rip at

Whangawehi Catchment Management Group, which protects and improves water quality in the Whangawehi catchment area. The Mahia environmentalist has a simple philosophy when it comes to seeking positive change.

"You have to step forward and you have to do something - don't just sit there and talk about it," she said of the Whangawehi Catchment Management Group which was sparked up in 2010.

She started the restoration of the Whangawehi water project on her own, but gradually the support grew and so did the determination to achieve a result. She described the Environmental Award, which she received, as "a milestone for Mahia"

The surfer was involved in a dramatic surf rescue when the four people were swept 70m offshore last year.

Late last year, only a month after heart surgery, he celebrated his 66th birthday by completing his 66th lap of Lake Taupo.

And riding round and round "the pond" as he calls Lake Taupo, for three months early last year, 65 times in 60 days covering 10,600km, Mr Anderson raised \$7000 for
